It was after I had insisted much that she finally gave me some of her work to read and give suggestions for improvement and that was how I landed my first job as an 'editor'. I wasn't paid for this job but the experience I gained was priceless. I finally met my wonderful mentor in person a whole year after I had worked under her and boy was I thrilled to. I thanked her so much for the guidance she had provided me with throughout this learning curve"

There is a lot we could learn from Peter about modern-day mentorship and the first thing is that there is a pool of mentors available to us now that geographic location is no longer a factor. Whatever your trade, chances are there is at least someone who has gone ahead of you and made it. Your job is to identify and pursue them for counsel.
